






Point-in-Time Homeless Count






Annualized Homeless Count









THN's Priorities for the 89th Legislative Session

- Strengthen Texas' Homeless Crisis Response Systems
 - Homeless Crisis Response Systems, or Continuums of Care, end homelessness through the strategic development of systems based on data-driven solutions. They do this well, and with more funding they would do more.
- Expand Affordable, Accessible housing opportunities
 - Ending homelessness requires housing. Texas must support the development and rehabilitation of more affordable housing if we want to end homelessness.
- Targeted, Intersectional Assistance
 - Recognizing the intersections between Texans we serve who are also assisted by other systems of care and intentionally collaborating to provide aid (i.e. people with disabilities)
- Play defense

Legislation THN supports this Session

- Budget increase for the Homeless Housing and Service Program funding
- Support for TRLI
- Pilot program providing homelessness prevention funding for Veteran led households
- Funding to provide support to community college students at risk or experiencing homelessness

- Expansion support for the Texas Homeless Data Sharing Network (THDSN)
- Trauma Informed training for peace officers working with people experiencing homelessness
- Establish a nonpenal law allowing for emergency detention in rare cases for the most severely mentally ill and expand Healthy Community Collaborative funding to assist with mental health treatment – May Support

Legislation That May Hinder Efforts to End Homelessness

These are examples of legislation we will play defense against – we will educate policymakers and advocates on bills that contain proposed actions that, in THN's opinion, limit opportunities for communities to address homelessness effectively.

Bills filed last session that are likely to return (more are likely to be filed in 2025):

- HB 2035/SB 986 Prohibits local eviction protections
- SB 1214 Gives county commissioners courts authority to refuse sale of property intended for ending homelessness
- <u>HB 4240</u> (Harrison)/<u>SB 1803</u> Statewide homeless Services Audit Bill. Would be duplicative and likely will require costly administrative adjustments to meet report requirements which will result in less money for services & shelter.



SB 2018 (Flores) – Would compel communities to aggressively enforce statewide camping ban lest risk losing tax revenue. It would increase costs on cities
